




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Introduction

The book of Proverbs tells us to "train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old, he will not depart from it." (Prov 22:6) Although our Orthodox faith never changes, the society and challenges our children face are always evolving. In light of this constant change, and in honor of the 100 year anniversary of establishment of Sunday school in 2018, the Coptic Orthodox Diocese of the Southern United States began working on a new curriculum named "Children of Light" to equip and educate our children in order to live a life pleasing to God in the midst of the world we live in. St Habib Girgis rightly reminds us that "education is the first need for the community after bread." Detailed Lesson Plan

- + B.I.B.L.E = Basic Instructions Before Leaving Earth.
- + The Bible is our guide and help as it helps us hear the Will of God.
- + Without searching and knowing the will of God, we are walking without purpose.
- + St. Paul's writings to the Thessalonians demonstrates how the people of Thessalonica received the word, but not because St. Paul or the disciples preached it to them, but because they believed that truly it was the word of God.
- + St. Paul also told St. Timothy that listening to the word of God will not always be easy and will have its struggles, but that he must continue to learn from Scripture as he has done from childhood. Likewise, we too must strive to learn the scripture from our childhood.
- + St. John Chrysostom teaches us that the Bible is how we know right from wrong, so that we may live a holy life. "By Scripture we may disprove what is false, be corrected, be brought to a right understanding, and be comforted and consoled." St. John Chrysostom- Homilies on 2 Timothy 9
- + We are reminded in the Liturgy of how the Word of God is lamp unto our feet when the candle is lit by deacons during the Gospel reading.

- + Our Faith is founded on the true word of God
- + The writings of the Bible are divinely inspired, which means God worked through different authors to write but each with their own personality. " All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteourness" 2 Timothy 3:16
- + St. Justin Martyr explained that the Bible was written by the Holy Spirit, but through mankind. "But when you hear the utterances of the prophets spoken as it were personally, you must not suppose that they are spoken by the inspired men themselves but by the divine Word who moves them."
- + Our Church does not believe that the Holy Spirit controlled the authors and told them what to write. Instead they were guided and given knowledge of spiritual truths for the benefit of us who can read it. It is how we can come to know God.
- + The Bible has been composed over the years by many authors, yet there is One Spirit and One common message. The authors all came from various backgrounds. The Bible has one problem (sin), one theme (salvation), one person (Christ), one goal (glorify God).

Objective

+ Importance of knowing and obeying the Bible, by doing so we become witness Christ in our relations with others

Application

Look for a verse that you like and apply it constantly with the guidance of your father of confession. For example, you may take the verse: "So the last will be first, and the first last." and attempt to apply it by being last in everything (eg. Last in line for lunch, last to sit down at the table, etc...)

Body Overview Bullet Points

Consider delivering the lesson through a discussion, a debate, a workshop or any other active-learning method.

- + There was a time where Biblical texts were not readily available.
- + So even though the Bible is inspired by God, it is not God's only method of communication.
- + He may speak to us through traditions, and most importantly through people who have preserved their spiritual lives who are thus unwritten epistles: "Do we begin again to commend ourselves? Or do we need, as some others, epistles of commendation to you or letters of commendation from you? You are our epistle written in our hearts, known and read by all men; clearly you are an epistle of Christ, ministered by us, written not with ink but by the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of flesh, that is, of the heart." - 2 Cor
- + We too must make sure to preserve our spiritual lives (I Peter 2:1, "laying aside" all evil), in order that we portray the image of Christ (Psalm 139:14)
- + The most perfect way to live is to live by love, since that is who God is. When people see us with love that is how they will know that we are followers of Jesus
- + St. John Chrysostom teaches that this is more meaningful than performing miracles. "Passing over the miracles that they were to perform, he makes love the distinguishing mark of his followers.... Miracles do not attract unbelievers as much as the way you live your life. And nothing brings about a proper life as
- + You may use the Story of Abba Daniel of Scetis being slapped by a demon possessed child and he responds by turning the cheek in obedience to the Bible. This in turn expels the demon because he portrayed the powerful living Bible.

- + Number of Books in the Bible:
 - First Canonical Books (39) + Deuterocanonical Books (7) Books alongside completion of the books of Esther and Daniel
 - New Testament: 27 Books
- + Sections of the OT and their respective overview:
 - Five Books of Moses/The Pentateuch/The Torah/ The Covenant, This Historic Books (Joshua to Esther), Poetic, Edification or Wisdom Books (from Job to the Song of Solomon), Prophetic Books (From Isaiah to Malachi)
- + The Church teaches us that the Old Testament was a shadow of the New Testament. St. John Chrysostom compares it to a painting, referring to the Law of the Old Testament, "For (he says) "the Law having a shadow of the good things to come not the very image of the things"; i.e. not the very reality. For as in painting, so long as one [only] draws the outlines, it is a sort of "shadow" but when one has added the bright paints and laid in the colors, then it becomes "an image." Something of this kind also was the Law." St. John Chrysostom, On the epistle to the Hebrews, 17.5.

- + Consider discussing the quote by St. Justin Martyr on the prophecy of the virginal birth: "And again hear what was prophesied through Isaiah the prophet, that he would be born of a virgin. He said, "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they will call his name, God with us." Through the prophetic spirit God announced beforehand that things which are unimaginable and believed to be impossible for human beings would take place, in order that when it occurred it would be believed and received by faith because it had been promised." First Apology, 33 and/or details on how the Midnight Praises during the Sunday Theotokia we talk about the different symbols and prophecies in the Old Testament that spoke of Christ and His virgin Mother.
- + You may consider making this a workshop by: Providing the children with the Prophecy Title, the Old testament verses, and find the corresponding NT verses separately and have them attempt to match the corresponding items together in teams.
- + You may conclude by explaining how rare it is for I person to simply fulfill 2-3 prophecies, but Christ has fulfilled hundreds. This is a beautiful support to our faith and the validity and authenticity of the Bible. It is also called the internal evidence of scripture.

Consider delivering the lesson through a discussion, a debate, a workshop or any other active-learning method.

Detailed Lesson Plan

There are currently no detailed lesson plans for this lesson.

- +The Bible is sometimes unmotivating, especially to study, but through our determination and commitment to God, we can develop a two-way relationship with Christ. We know that the word of God is powerful and living (Hebrews 4:12), so we should be encouraged to read it with open hearts to hear God's message.
- + St. Antony was able to hear the voice of God through the holy Readings, which led him to give up everything and become the Father of Monasticism. This only happened because He had a relationship with God and could hear His message to Him. He heard the Gospel telling Him to sell all, and understood it as a direct message to Him.
- + In the book of Acts, we see the Ethiopian Eunuch who was reading the Scriptures while traveling on the road. St. John Chrysosotom says we should have the same desire to read the Scriptures. "Consider, I ask you, what a great effort it was not to neglect reading even while on a journey, and especially while seated in a chariot. Let this be heeded by those people who do not even deign to do it at home but rather think reading the Scriptures is a waste of time, claiming as an excuse their living with a wife, conscription in military service, caring for children, attending to domestics and looking after other concerns, they do not think it necessary for them to show any interest in reading the holy Scriptures." Homilies on Genesis 35.3
- + The following are 3 simple methods proposed by H.G. Bishop Moussa
 - Practical/Literal Method Method: This is where we simply read the Bible, understand God's practical commandments, and ask God to give us the grace to go and practice them.
 - The Contemplative Method: In this method, one reads some verses and repeats them to oneself calmly and deeply until he/she relates to it and is able to express it in a prayer.
 - The analytical Method: In this method, we study a passage in depth through external readings, writings and sermons of church fathers as some passages are more complex, this helps clarify some passages and put them in context.
- + You may additionally be motivated by having a reading accountability partner.

- + God chose to create us out of His love to enjoy all that he is and all that He has done for us.
- + God created everything first, then made man.
- + God created us in His image in order to enjoy a relationship with Him. He did not create the world out of necessity rather as a product of His free will, goodness, wisdom, love and omnipotence so that we may participate in His goodness.
 - Saint Gregory the Theologian says: "There is a certain firstness, secondness, thirdness, and so on to the seventh day of rest from works, and by these days is divided all that is created, being brought into order by unutterable laws, but not produced in an instant, by the Almighty Word, for Whom to think or to speak means already to perform the deed. If man appeared in the world last, honored by the handiwork and image of God, this is not in the least surprising; since for him, as for a king, the royal dwelling had to be prepared and only then was the king to be led in, accompanied by all creatures." ... "The world was not conceived by chance and without reason, but for an useful end and for the great advantage of all beings, it is really the school where reasonable souls exercise themselves, the training ground where they learn to know God; by sight of visible and sensible things the mind is led, as by a hand, to the contemplation of invisible things."
 - An eastern Church Father (John of Damascus) says: "Because, the Good and Most Kind God did not regard as sufficient the contemplation of Himself, but because of His excessive Goodness He took delight in creating beings which would benefit and participate in His kindness, has brought into being all creation- visible and invisible- out of non existence, including man, who is made of visible and invisible elements. He thinks and He builds, and His thoughts become deeds, which are accomplished by Word and fulfilled by the Spirit"

+Parable of the Vinedresser portrays evil happening and the master continuously allowing it and giving second chances. Discuss how they think God responds to evil in the world.

There is the problem of evil in our lives which is rooted in free will

- + God gives us free will and choice, or else it wouldn't be love.
- + Adam and Eve started off walking with God then were tempted by the devil by pride/selfishness
- + When we choose to walk with God in obedience, that is true freedom (from sin).
- + Christ came and conquered evil and gave us the choice to be victorious over evil.

When it comes to problem of evil in the world (which is also rooted in free will, but mainly of that of others), ensure to remind them that God is:

- All-Powerful, All Good, All knowing. His ways are not our ways, nor His thoughts our thoughts. Accordingly let us trust Him, for only He knows what true love is.
 - "Again, it is impious to say that evil has its origin from God, because nothing contrary is produced by the contrary. Life does not generate death, nor is darkness the beginning of light, nor is disease the maker of health... Accordingly, they say, if it is not uncreated nor created by God, whence does it have its nature? No one who is in this world will deny that evil exist. What, then, do we say? That evil is not a living and animated substance, but a condition of the soul which is opposed to virtue and which springs up in the slothful because of their falling away from good."
 - Saint Basil (Hexaemeron, Homily 2:4-5)
- + We pray that God cleanses us from all tendencies of evil in every liturgy, as if we hope to reduce the level of evil in the world, it begins with us.
